The Endurance Capital Committee (ECC) is one of the City of Auburn's official commissions and was created after we named ourselves the "Endurance Capital of the World" in 2003. The ECC's mission is to promote the Auburn area's healthy lifestyle and to encourage community members to use local natural resources for personal health and fitness goals. Like all City commissions, the ECC is made up of hard-working volunteers who develop and work plans to meet the mission, such as these for 2013-2014:

- "All Trails Lead to Auburn" cotton twill baseball hats are due to arrive at any moment! These will be available for purchase at the Placer County Visitors Center in downtown Auburn. Proceeds will be used to develop and purchase additional logo wear items.



- The ECC partnered with the Auburn Recreation District (ARD) for the very popular "100" Challenge. Upon completion of 100 hours of ARD activities (such as swimming, Zumba, pickle ball, yoga, etc.) or a 100-mile distance (on a bike, on foot or on a horse), the participant receives a handsome certificate. Participants will also be honored at a year-end party with a special award. All ages are welcome! Applications may be obtained at the ARD office.
- A Trail Etiquette Manual specific to the Auburn State Recreation Area (SRA) has been posted on the ECC's website, www.auburnendurancecapital.com.
- The ECC conducted meetings among user groups (hikers, mountain bikers, equestrians, runners, etc.) for feedback concerning trail usage to that Auburn SRA rangers can use as they develop their General Plan.

It is mandatory to have trash service in the City of Auburn, and with summer warming things up a bit, we have some tips on the neighborly way to meet your civic duty. Bagging and tying up your household garbage will help minimize odors and attraction for flies, ants, wasps and other insects. (It even works for the family pet's waste!) Green waste can also get rather "ripe" with all those yard clippings. If you don't have a green waste toter, you may be eligible for a free one-- give the friendly staff at Recology a call at 530-885-3735. It only takes a few moments to tidy up, keep the lids secure and get the cans to the curb on time. It'll be nicer for your neighbors, and will save a visit from our Code Enforcement staff who get a lot of calls about stinky garbage and improper recycling. Saturday, June 14 is our once-a-year free pick-up for trash and bulky household items that can fit into cans, toters, bags or bundles that can be handled by one person. Put your items out on Friday night, since the trucks will sweep the entire city starting early Saturday morning. Pay attention to these limitations so you can be sure your items will be picked up:

- One cubic yard limit
- No longer than three feet
- No heavier than 40 pounds
- No large pieces of furniture, refrigerators or appliances
- No electronic waste
- No tires or toxic materials (paints, solvents, motor oils, pesticides, etc.)

If you are not sure about something, call Recology at 885-3735 or City Public Works at 823-4211 x145. If you put it out on the curb and it's not acceptable, you are responsible for removing it. It's a great way to finish up that spring cleaning!

F_N Auburn Employs a CASp!

In case you didn't know... the Division of the State Architect (DSA) has a program for voluntary designation of Certified Access Specialists (CASp) as required by state law. This program is designed to meet the public's need for experienced individuals who can help match the compliance of buildings and sites with State of California codes and federal Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements for accessibility. The CASp system is designed to help property owners and prevent unnecessary lawsuits. Why are we telling you this now? The law also requires local agencies to employ or retain Certified Access Specialists by July 2014 to conduct all plan checks as they relate to accessibility... and ours is now in City Hall! Jon May is one of the 572 certified specialists in California and can be found in the Building Department in Room #3. We welcome you to stop by if you have any accessibility questions related to your business or property in the city limits.

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
