### News & Events

1. Several fuels clearing projects have been undertaken throughout the City. Many of which utilized AFD staff along with volunteers in the community.
2. Auburn Firefighters prepare for fire season with wildland refresher training. The training took 1 ½ weeks to complete and was hosted in Rocklin/Lincoln.
3. Auburn Fire now teaches the “Stop the Bleed” curriculum to schools and organizations. This national program goes hand in hand with CPR and basic first aid.
4. Auburn Firefighters received Wildfire Structure Ignition training/certification and will offer home assessments to residents starting in June, 2019.
5. Auburn Fire has partnered with the California Joint Apprentice Committee and enrolled 8 employees in their program. Apprentice employees will be trained to CAL-JAC standards, which mirror State Board of Fire Services and National Fire Protection Association standards.

## **Significant Emergency Incidents**

### **Field Save**

**Auburn Fairgrounds, May 3<sup>rd</sup>** - At 5:18pm, Engine 1285 responded to a medical aid at the Auburn Fairgrounds for an unknown type fall. Engine 1285 arrived to find an adult male, pulseless and not breathing with bystander CPR being performed. Engine 1285 continued CPR, delivered one shock via the AED, and utilized the advanced I-Gel airway. After approximately several minutes of CPR, the adult male regained a pulse and even started to breathe on his own. The patient was transferred to the hospital while still breathing and with stable vitals. The patient is now recovering at his home.

### **Aircraft Down**

**Auburn Municipal Airport, May 6<sup>th</sup>** - At 1:07pm an aircraft was reported down on the runway of the Auburn Municipal Airport. Automatic Aid engines arrived and reported only a minor injury from the pilot who was able to walk away from the crash. B1213 established unified command with APD. Once the emergency was mitigated (patient treated & fuel leak stopped), notifications were made to the FAA, NTSB, Flight Services, Placer OES, and Placer County Environmental Health. NTSB authorized the airplane to be re-located. The aircraft was towed to the West end of the airport and properly oriented by Hall's Towing. The airport was re-opened at approximately 4:00pm.

### **Commercial Structure Fire**

**440 Grass Valley Highway, May 19<sup>th</sup>** - At 8:59am, Auburn Fire responded to a reported commercial structure fire with flames showing at 436 Grass Valley Highway. Auburn Fire units arrived at scene and found a single-wide detached mobile structure that was on fire just north of 436 Grass Valley Highway. Auburn Fire units, with automatic aid assistance, extinguished the fire, performed a search, completed salvage/overhaul and preserved the area of origin. Auburn Fire Investigators Captain Croft and Firefighter Gray performed the investigation and found the cause of the fire to be unintentional and undetermined.

### **Aircraft Down**

**Auburn Municipal Airport, May 25<sup>th</sup>** - At 1:01pm an aircraft was reported down on the runway of the Auburn Municipal Airport. CHP H-24 was the first on scene and reported both occupants of the aircraft non-injury and had walked away from the crash. B1217 arrived on scene with Automatic Aid resources and established unified command with APD. The airport was shut down and notifications were made to the FAA & NTSB. NTSB authorized the plane to be re-located and airport volunteers assisted with its removal. The airport was re-opened at approximately 4:00pm.

- April 13<sup>th</sup>- B1217 (Zaucha) along with E1285 (D'Ambrogi & company), Public Works, and community volunteers worked together to clear the City Parcel between Auburn Folsom and High Street.
- April 24<sup>th</sup>- B1213 (Williamson) along with E1285 (Croft & company) assisted at the awards ceremony for the Auburn Rodeo. Stickers and helmets were given out to children.
- May 3<sup>rd</sup>- B1217 (Zaucha) went with the Lindholdt Family to a luncheon hosted by the Sacramento District Attorney's Office to Honor First Responders.
- May 8<sup>th</sup>- B1217 (Zaucha), B1215 (Rogers), and several AFD staff held multiple trainings for the Placer High School Staff. Half of the staff performed a tabletop scenario with an active shooter on campus. The other half learned how to "Stop the Bleed" from our certified instructors. The training will take place again in the Fall and the staff will rotate roles.
- May 11<sup>th</sup>- B1213 (Williamson) along with E1285 (Croft & company) lead a fuels clearing project at the Bi-Centennial Park as part of Community Day. Afterwards a luncheon was held at the Rec Park to thank the volunteers.
- May 15<sup>th</sup>- Captain D'Ambrogi and company led a station tour at Firehouse #2 for a group of preschoolers. Basic fire safety was reinforced and at the end they get to spray water from the fire engine.
- May 18<sup>th</sup>- Captain Croft and company attended the Auburn Home Show at the Auburn Fairgrounds. They passed out stickers and fire helmets and helped to educate the community on fire safety.
- May 24<sup>th</sup>- Captain Croft and company led a fire safety event at the Auburn Ravine Terrace Apartments. Emergency planning, evacuation routes, and sheltering in place were among some of the topics.
- May 24<sup>th</sup>- AFD staff performed a site visit at the Northern California Terminal Radar Approach Control in Mather, CA. It was an excellent opportunity to learn more about the aviation industry and how we can better prepare for an incident at the Auburn Municipal Airport.
- May 25<sup>th</sup>- Captain Rogers and company helped a group of community volunteers clear brush between Auburn Folsom Road and Orrin Drive. These efforts are growing in number and our firefighters are glad to be able to assist.
